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# President's Pulpit

# **Executive Committee Summary**

We had some visitors at the meeting. Richard Venus and Chuck Thomas came to present a proposal that Richard will speak about more fully on March 19th. Basically, now that Chuck is back he would like our congregation to consider putting things back the way they were before Chuck submitted his letter of resignation. Richard will mention on the 19<sup>th</sup> that he wants to devote most of his energies to the church that employs him on half-time status. Secondly, he feels that while he took the position as a favor to us and to Chuck - he is really not the right person for the job. In fact, he told the Search Committee the exact same thing. And then there is the not-so-small task of writing a book, which he is trying to accomplish in his spare time. With what is left of his spare time he is also writing a descriptive section of a book on comparative religion that describes the UU denomination and philosophy. No small task that either!

We decided to bring the question to a vote of the membership during the next annual meeting in May, and in the meantime go ahead and schedule Chuck to take Richard's last two dates. The changes are now reflected on the schedule page of the website.

In other business, **Colin Dunbar** proposed that the annual budget of the Fellowship be brought before the congregation for approval at the annual meeting from hence forth. We agreed in principle and asked Colin to present us with some proposed wording for incorporation into the Rules of Conduct that would

implement that concept. He will have such ready for the next Exec. Meeting in March. It should be noted that this will require a major re-arrangement in the way that the committee does its financial planning, yet the good points seem to far outweigh that issue.

Also mentioned was the fact that the anti-war poster which the committee authorized placing in the Wayside Pulpit had not yet come in. (It arrived this week and will be positioned soon.) It is a 60's slogan that **Edie Dunbar** wears on a pendant. Curious? Come take a look...

Finally, we had talked about expanding our social action efforts in the community and settled on the idea of joining our Fellowship's appropriate Neighborhood Association as a way of doing that. It turns out that the one that covers our area is Riverside North, cochaired by none other than **David and Estella Adams**. That group did not have a membership category for non-profit groups, so we asked them to create one. They did so and decided that \$10 a year in dues would be appropriate. That sum was paid at their last meeting, so the Fellowship is now officially a member of Riverside North. Any and all members of our congregation are welcome to attend their meetings on the first Thursday of each month.

#### Other Announcements

Offertory takers, take note! Since the UUA is now requiring that all congregations submit weekly attendance figures for the previous year as part of the annual certification process, I am getting up on my Presidential high-horse and asking all those who take the Offertory to stop when they take the collection to the back and take a quick count. That group is tasked to present a slate of officers in mid-April and time is short, so on an emergency basis, I was instructed by the Executive Committee to ignore the election requirements of the Rules of Conduct and appoint a successor. # Lemon Marinated Turkey Breast

Recipe is for ½ cooked turkey breast, sliced. I used one whole Butterball Skinless and Boneless Turkey Breast, cooked according to instructions and sliced.

In a small bowl, whisk together 3TBSP lemon juice, 1.5 Tsp Balsamic Vinegar, ½ cup olive oil, salt & pepper to taste. Stir in zest of 1 large lemon, 1/3 cup golden raisins that were soaked in a cup of boiling water for 5 min & drained. (Boil water, remove from heat, add raisins) & 2 TBSP capers. Pour over turkey & marinate, covered, a minimum of 4 hours, turning the turkey slices occasionally. Can be made day before.

Remove from fridge  $\frac{1}{2}$  hr before serving & sprinkle with 1 or 2 TBSP chopped parsley & 1 TBSP chopped mint (if avail.). Sprinkle w/3 TBSP toasted (just a few min. in a dry skillet on mod. heat) pine nuts & serve.
